4.2 Computerization of administration and library:

The College office is computerised with advancement made by incorporating “Student Management System” software. A number of computers with all its necessary accessories, one server and a high-tech photo copier machine have been installed, so that the system can run in its fullest potential. The Student Admission process has been computerised partially with the help of ‘Admitex’ software for proper and smooth management of the service. In due course it is expected to be fully computerised. Computer based Biometric controlled attendance system for teaching and non-teaching staffs is already in operation. FINAERP (Accounts) is running from the year 2011 for maintenance of college accounts.

In the library, in addition to the existing facilities, KOHA software is introduced for library automation. Primary target is the computerisation of Catalogue and book lending system. The college aims to upgrade to an e-library and looks forward to substantial automation in near future.

Barasat College carries the torch of education to spread the light of knowledge and illuminate even the farthest corners of the society.

The vision of the institution is to provide maximum educational facilities to the learners belonging to the weaker and underprivileged section of the society, coming from rural and semi-urban area and to enrich them in their academic field as well as carrier-oriented field.

MISSION :

The mission of the institution is to provide “Life centric and job oriented” quality higher education through a modern multi-faculty college wherein the students can be well taught and trained to build social awareness and responsibilities towards the society and to become partners in the socio-economic development of the country. Ours is a semi-urban college surrounded by agrarian areas. It is a matter of great challenge for us to expand the periphery of higher education quantitatively without compromising quality. We try to input social value among the students. It is highly expected that they will convey it to the larger society.

The mission of Barasat College is to educate its students to help creating a self-reliant, self-sustaining, self-confident self- respectful and innovative generation to present India with a skilled human resource that is free from the shackles of narrowness, selfishness or prejudice and competent enough to feed the need of the emergent India.

The college takes on the great challenge of providing a uniform milieu for education acceptable to the students and their families in the semi -urban region from mainly an agrarian society but hailing from a diverse socio-eco-cultural and religious background.

We constantly innovate, upgrade, modify and modernize the administrative management and teaching methods to keep it contemporary.

The benefits of education should not be limited to only a few. Barasat College has the mission of widen the access to education for under-privileged sections of the society to integrate them in the process of nation building.

We offer different course options for higher education in science, humanities and commerce to suit the differing needs of youth, who want to get themselves educated.

Conventional education only is not adequate for all round human development. Barasat College encourages its students in developing their skills in co and extra-curricular activities in sports and cultural arena.

It is an undergraduate college having B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. programmes. In the past our college was affiliated to Calcutta University. To satisfy the needs of the society we have introduced different honours courses phase by phase with proper approval from Calcutta University.

After the formation of West Bengal State University for the district of North 24-Parganas we have come under the affiliation of this new University. We have introduced honours courses in Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Mathematics and Computer Science in 2012 after getting approval from the newly set-up University. PG teaching is imparted through the Distance Education Mode. The college has applied for necessary permission from the Higher Education Council for the opening of self-financial PG Courses in Commerce and Bengali. One of the essential strengths of the college is its student strength of nearly 7,000 students per session. The number is likely to double if we consider the PG Courses in distance and regular mode in future.

6.2 Does the Institution have a management Information System?

E- governance is the ultimate goal of the college for smooth and transparent functioning of all its departments both academic and administrative. Already the college has started working in that direction.
The data related to the students' details, fees, admission, examination etc. is partially computerised. One software "Admitex" has been installed for this purpose
The college accounts, salary accounts of the teaching and non-teaching staffs etc. is maintained through the software FINAERP.
Computer based biometric controlled attendance for both teaching and nonteaching staff has already been introduced.
In Library, KOHA software has been installed for computerisation of the library system. Work in that direction is in progress.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development:

The staff members are allowed and encouraged to undergo Orientation and Refresher courses organized by the staff academic colleges of various universities.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning:

The college brings out an academic calendar at the beginning of every academic year. For each year the teaching plans are prepared by the teachers based on the subject allotment. Before the students appear at Part-I, Part-II & Part-III University Final Examination, they have to sit for preparatory examination held by the college. Internal tests are conducted to evaluate the students and the schedule of tests is incorporated in the academic calendar itself. The teachers of most departments make use of chart, model, graphs, diagrams, notes, model questions, black board, white board, computer, power point, reference books etc.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation:

The Examination Committee as per the academic calendar prepares the schedule for Internal Assessment Test (IAT). Question paper setting is done according to the norms of university. Evaluations of overall performances of the students are done and discussed at the Guardians' Meet.

6.3.4 Research and Development:

Some teachers are engaged in doctoral and project research and field work. IQAC motivates the teachers to publish regularly in peer-reviewed journals.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation:

Air conditioners, water purifiers have been installed in the college premises. New computers were purchased and installed in the college office.

There are no efforts on behalf of the University to promote autonomy to affiliated / constituent colleges, but some of the internal matters are left to the College authority for execution.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association:

Despite its unregistered status, the Alumni Association has been providing all-round support towards the institution in organizing and hosting different events. A number of members of the Alumni Association were appointed as teaching faculty and non-teaching staff members by the College Authority. They are serving as the ears of the institution in bringing back the feedback on the impact of the institution on the society.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent – Teacher Association

There is no parent teacher association as such, but the parents of the students meet the concerned teachers and departments whenever necessary and provide their invaluable suggestions. All parents are encouraged to meet the management with problems of their wards (emotional, academic, financial and otherwise) and with concrete suggestions for development. Their feedback is closely monitored and strictly adhered to.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff :

The office staff undergo a very basic training to run the software related to the student transactions . No other development programme for support staff has been held by the institution. However, every individual employee is encouraged to undertake any course/training programme after the working hours to upgrade and improve his/her skills and qualifications. The head-clerk and the non-teaching council monitor the performances of the support staff and report their impression to the Governing Body through the executive head of the college.

6.14 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly:

- Prohibition of smoking in the college premises.
- Making the college premises plastic-free zone.
- Removal of the practice of unnecessary wastage water and electricity.

- ✚ The institution has provision for adult and continuing education through RBOU.

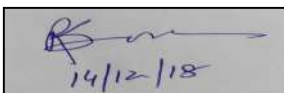

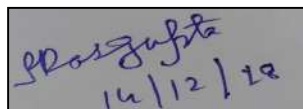
